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Preface





More than just a lecture, the Flourishing Community Masterclass became a moment of reflection and renewal for the FHSS fraternity and the wider community. These additions are expected to expand the faculty's academic portfolio and offer students new avenues to pursue careers in language studies, diplomacy, governance, and international affairs.

The visit by the CUE team reaffirmed the faculty's commitment to upholding the highest standards of quality and relevance in its academic offerings. As the faculty awaits the final report and accreditation outcomes, FHSS remains steadfast in its mission to provide transformative education that shapes competent, ethical, and socially responsive graduates who are well-prepared to serve their communities and the nation at large.

Prof. Jospeter M. Mbuba's Lasting Impact on Criminology at Chuka University

Prof. Jospeter M. Mbuba of Purdue University has left a remarkable and enduring legacy at Chuka University through his immense contributions to the growth of Criminology and Security Studies.

In 2017, Prof. Mbuba spearheaded the establishment of the Bachelor's and Master's programs in Criminology and Security Studies with support from the Carnegie African Diaspora Fellowship. His vision and leadership culminated in the creation of the Ph.D. program in 2019, made possible through funding from CODESRIA, positioning Chuka University as a hub for advanced criminology scholarship in the region.

Beyond curriculum development, Prof. Mbuba has enriched the university's academic resources by donating over 60 book titles, including core texts such as *Criminal Investigation* and *Criminal Justice*. These contributions have significantly strengthened research, teaching, and student learning within the field.

The Vice Chancellor, Prof. Henry Mutembei, commended Prof. Mbuba for his invaluable support, noting that his efforts have transformed criminology studies at Chuka University into a robust and competitive discipline. From groundbreaking research to shaping county policy, Mr. Rufo Munene continues to embody the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences' (FHSS) vision of blending academic excellence with real-world impact.

As a lead researcher on a Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation-funded project (2020–2025), Mr. Munene has played a pivotal role in implementing a pioneering crèche programme in Tharaka Nithi County. This transformative initiative aims to enhance women's livelihoods, increase female labour force participation, and improve child development outcomes. Now in its final phase, the project stands as a model of research-driven social innovation with potential for national replication.

Beyond research, Mr. Munene has been instrumental in shaping key county-level policies. He contributed significantly to the development of the Tharaka Nithi County Culture and Heritage Policy (in partnership with the Institute for Culture and Ecology and the County Government) as well as the Tharaka Nithi County Agro-ecology Policy, demonstrating how scholarly expertise can inform and influence policy frameworks that safeguard cultural identity and promote sustainable development.

His commitment to student growth and mentorship is equally outstanding. He has successfully connected students to internship and attachment opportunities with leading organisations including Compassion Kenya, CARITAS, and the Red Cross, and is actively pursuing formal MOUs to strengthen these institutional partnerships. Through community outreach programmes with UNBOUND Kenya, he has also engaged students in supporting vulnerable households to chart sustainable paths out of poverty—instilling in them a sense of civic responsibility and hands-on experience in social transformation.



Academically, Mr. Munene continues to contribute to global scholarship. His recent publication, *When Communities Are Part of the Problem in Community-Based Inclusive Development*, was published by Springer Nature Link, one of the most prestigious academic platforms worldwide, underscoring his intellectual leadership on issues of inclusive development and community resilience.
